## PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION GUIDELINES

St. Mary's School asks your help in NOT sending medication to school as most prescribed medications can be given at home. For example, if a medication is ordered three times a day, you can give one in the morning, after school and before bed. However, there may be a unique situation in which your child will require a prescription medication to be administered during school hours.

If your child requires that a medication be administered at school, the health office will follow these guidelines:

- 1. A <u>Prescription Medication Request/Physician Authorization</u> form will need to be signed by a parent or legal guardian and physician.
- 2. Prescription medication must come to school in the original container, labeled for the student by the pharmacy. The pharmacy label must be consistent with the physician's written order, and include:
  - a. Patient Name
  - b. Pharmacy Name, Address, and Telephone Number
  - c. Physician or Prescribing Practitioner Name
  - d. Dose/Strength and Directions for Use
  - e. Manufacturer Name
  - f. Date of Original Issue
- 3. Students will not be allowed to carry or transport medications to school. Parents must bring all medication to the health office.
- 4. Students are **only allowed to take medication** in school when it is administered by health office staff.
- 5. Medication that is not FDA approved (i.e. homeopathic, vitamins, supplements) will NOT be administered in school.
- 6. The health office will **not be responsible for cutting or splitting pills**.
